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SING YIN SECONDARY SCHOOL

Sing Yin Secondary School was founded at 11, On Tin Street, Lam Tin in September 1970 under the sponsorship of the Divine Word Missionaries. It was built and administered by Rev. Patrick Canavan who was its principal and supervisor for more than twenty years. Under Fr. Canavan's able leadership, Sing Yin quickly developed into a top quality school where students can receive a good, all-round education. On 1 September 2011, it moved to 38 New Clear Water Bay Road.

The Divine Word Missionaries, the sponsoring body of Sing Yin Secondary School, is an international Catholic society of priests and brothers. It was founded by a German priest, Fr. Arnold Janssen, in 1875 and China was the first mission of the society. In 1879, Fr. Joseph Freinademetz boarded a ship to Hong Kong and started his missionary work here. Fr. Arnold Janssen and Fr. Joseph Freinademetz were canonized on 5 October 2003 by Pope John Paul II. The Divine Word Missionaries has grown steadily and there are now over 6,000 priests and brothers working in more than 80 countries around the world.

Sing Yin Secondary School gets its name from the Bible. The Gospel of John opens with the words "In the beginning was the Word". This "Word" refers to the Son of God who became man in the person of Jesus Christ. For Christian, He is the Way, the Truth and the Life.

Sing Yin is a Catholic school and, following the teaching of Jesus, special emphasis is given to moral education and community service. In this way, Sing Yin aims to give its students the best possible set of values by which to live a meaningful life and, at the same time, to become true pillars of society.

聖言中學簡介

聖言中學於一九七零年九月於藍田安田街十一號開校,為聖言會主辦的天主教學校。 聖言中學是由甘百德神父籌辦和監建的,甘神父其後更出任本校校長及校監二十多年。 在他的英明領導下,聖言中學迅速發展為一所優質學校,為學生提供良好、整全的教育。 本校於二零一一年九月一日遷到新清水灣道三十八號現址。

聖言會乃一個世界性的天主教修會團體。它在一八七五年由德國神父楊生安諾所創立,並先在中國從事傳道工作。一八七九年福若瑟神父來到香港開始傳教。二零零三年十月五日前任教宗若望保祿二世為聖楊生神父及聖福若瑟神父封聖。聖言會穩健地發展,現今已有六千名以上的神父及修士在八十多個國家服務。

「聖言」這個名字是源自若望福音第一章 「在起初已有聖言」。「聖言」是指天主聖子降生成人,就是耶穌基督。為基督徒來說,祂就是道路、真理、生命。

作為一所天主教學校,聖言中學遵從耶穌的教導,特別注重道德教育及社區服務。本 校辦學的目標,正在於扶助學生確立一套圓滿的價值觀,以活得富有意義,並且成為社會 的真正棟樑。

School Goals

Our goal is to prepare students to live a healthy, affluent and meaningful life. More specifically, we aim:

- 1. To help students to appreciate life and to develop a commitment to sustain all lives, especially human life forever. Thus environmental education should be a core goal of our education.
- 2. To help students consolidate the values and attitudes necessary for the development of moral character, such as: Faith, Hope, Love, Appreciation, Respect, Responsibility, Peace, Honesty, Justice, Self-discipline, Service, Co-operation, Simplicity, Courage, Perseverance, Sincerity, Tolerance, Self-Restraint and Delayed Gratification on which the sustainable development of the human race are based. These values are to be interpreted in the light of the Bible and good, traditional Chinese culture.
- 3. To strive to develop in our students the ability to think, judge, and act objectively and independently that is, to be wise and rational. Critical thinking and debating skills are important, but students must know the shortcomings of these skills. On the other hand, we need to ensure that our students are sympathetic and be able to express their feelings in proper ways.
- 4. To enable our students to solve the problems they will face in life and societal problems, taking into consideration the pros and cons of different solutions and not be biased by advocacy opinions and other factors. The solutions adopted should be effective, efficient, fair and just.
- 5. To ensure that our students strive for a balance between their rights and responsibilities.
- 6. To guide the students towards finding meaning and purpose in their lives through an awareness of the existence of God and their obligation to serve God by developing their aptitudes in order to serve not just themselves but also to serve their fellow humans as members of God's great human family.
- 7. To provide for the full and proper formation of Catholic students.
- 8. To provide non-Christians with the opportunity of knowing about the life and teaching of Christ and to provide religious instruction for any non-Christian who freely desires it.
- 9. To promote respect for lawful government and its representatives, the observance of just laws, and a search for the common good which includes civic values such as freedom, social justice, and the dignity of work. Related activities should be appropriate to the developmental stages of students.
- 10. To vigorously promote voluntary service by the students both in and out of school.

- 11. To foster in our students a reverence for life in all its stages, an understanding of the significance of family life for the individual and for society, and the conditions conducive to a good family life. They should embrace filial duty, love their wives and care for their off springs.
- 12. To enable students to live a physically and psychologically healthy life now and after graduation.
- 13. To develop a challenging and comprehensive curriculum which will match the students interests and abilities and which will provide them with the knowledge, skills and attitudes which will enable them to have a better understanding of the world, become financially independent and capable of playing a positive role in the social and economic development of the community.
- 14. To help the students reach a good standard in both written Chinese and English, and to communicate fluently in Cantonese, Mandarin and English.
- 15. To provide the students with a basic knowledge of the society they live in, with special emphasis on the history and geography of China, and to cultivate in them a love of our Mother Country and Mother Earth.
- 16. To provide a chance for students to develop a basic appreciation of Art, Music and Chinese Literature and to foster interest in their Chinese cultural heritage.
- 17. To enable the students to understand the methods of Science, the influence of Science on human life, the main scientific facts, and the relationship of science to the Christian religion. We hold that science and religion are complementary rather than contradictory.
- 18. To develop leadership, career aspiration and personal interests of the students through extra-curricular activities.
- 19. To provide for the Pastoral Care of the Students with the assistance of the Social Workers and the Guidance Department.
- 20. To provide effective lines of communication among the administration, the staff, the parents, the students and the local community.
- 21. In the spirit of the Gospel to promote a pleasant, caring, family atmosphere within the school community which includes the Staff, the Students and the School administrators.

Most of these goals are further developed into two layers of sub-goals. At the fundamental layer, the spiritual, moral, cognitive, physical, social and aesthetic goals are of equal importance. At the higher layer, spiritual and moral goals come first, followed by cognitive goals. The social, physical and aesthetic sub-goals should be prioritized on an individual basis.

Summary Report

The 2021-2022 school year was another year facing challenges and hardships. According to the Government Policy, a full-day in-person teaching was only allowed when over 70 per cent of students had received two doses of Covid-19 vaccine. Since our school did not meet this requirement, we could only resume half-day face-to-face lessons.

Starting from 1st September 2021, for the sake of the students' studies and healthy life, we adopted a modified special timetable. The first lesson started at 8:25 am and the eighth lesson ended at 1:45 pm, with the lesson time in each period being 35 minutes. All extra-curricular activities were held via ZOOM on weekday afternoons and Saturday mornings.

The Prayer Meeting for New School Year, the Divine Word Missionaries Foundation Day Prayer Meeting and the Inauguration Ceremony of Prefects were held in September. F.1 students attended the events in the school hall whereas F.2-F.6 students participated through online broadcast.

The First Term Test was held in October 2021. No regular lessons were held during the test period. Swimming Gala and Sports Day were cancelled. Yet, students experienced different kinds of new sports on campus on Sports Day.

On 20th January 2022, Education Bureau announced that all schools had to suspend face-to-face lessons on and after 24th January 2022 because of the fifth wave of pandemic. Since a F.5 student was confirmed COVID-19 positive on 20th January 2022, the school was closed from 21st to 23rd January 2022 for thorough disinfection.

F.1-F.5 students had their zoom lessons from 24th to 27th January 2022. After the Chinese New Year Holiday, the students continued to have their zoom lessons from 8th February 2022 to 16th March 2022.

F.6 Mock examination was held as scheduled from 18th January 2022 to 16th February 2022. They had their zoom lessons for revision after mock examination period. The last day was 28th February 2022.

There was a special vacation from 17th March 2022 to 28th April 2022. The Second Term Test was cancelled to allow more lesson time to prepare for the students' final examination.

The F.3 Parents' Day was replaced by a series of online information sessions to be held on 19th March 2022.

F.6 Graduation Ceremony was held in the school hall on 27th May 2022.

The Final Examination was postponed to the period from 4th July 2022 to 18th July 2022.

The Post Exam Activities scheduled on 28^{th} - 30^{th} June 2022 and 4^{th} - 5^{th} July 2022 were rescheduled to the period from 18^{th} July 2022 to 22^{nd} July 2022.

Last school day was 2nd August 2022.

Summer holiday started from 3rd August 2022.

Despite the COVID-19 outbreak, the 2022 HKDSE result was good. In extra-curricular activities, a total of 313 prizes in local and international competitions were won.

On 1st April 2021, the Education Bureau announced measures to optimize the four senior secondary core subjects (Chinese Language, English Language, Mathematics, and Citizenship and Social Development in lieu of Liberal Studies). The optimizing measures were implemented from F.4, starting from 2021-2022. In F.4, there were 3 lessons for Citizenship and Social Development and 6 lessons for each elective subjects. One lesson per cycle of each language subject, Chinese Language and English Language, was assigned to enable students to have more participation in Other Learning Experiences according to their departmental plans. The lessons were OLE (Chinese Language) and OLE (English Language) respectively. Language teachers of the class were the teachers in-charge of these lessons.

For National Security Education, the school set up a working party of 5 teachers to review and make up plans for the school year 2021-2022.

This year, there was one non-Chinese speaking (NCS) student in Form 1. We applied the EDB's funding for Enhancing Support for Learning and Teaching Chinese for him. A teaching assistant (NCS) was recruited to help him.

Academic Achievement

In the 2022 HKDSE, the percentage of Level 4 or above was 64.5.

74.8% of our graduates were enrolled into degree programmes. 23.0% of our graduates were enrolled into associate degree or sub-degree programmes. Altogether, over 97% of our graduates were admitted to universities and other tertiary institutes.

Achievement in Extra-curricular Activities

The students in the Editorial Board of Sing Yin Bulletin won the Gold Award in the 32nd Hong Kong Print Awards.

Chau Lai Yin (F.6) was selected to be one of the Hong Kong Team members of the National Olympiad in Informatics 2022. Chau Lai Yin (F.6), Tai Siu Cheong (F.6) and Cheung Yik Fung (F.5) won the First, Second and Third Class Honour in the National Olympiad in Informatics in Provinces 2021, respectively. Cheung Yik Fung (F.5) won the Gold Medal in the Hong Kong Olympiad in Informatics. Chau Lai Yin (F.6) won the Gold Medal in the Hong Kong Secondary School Coding Challenge 2022. The Competitive Programming Team won the Silver Award in the La Salle – Pui Ching Programming Challenge 2022. Cheung Yik Fung (F.5) won the Gold Medal in the Hong Kong Olympiad in Informatics 2021-2022. Chan Ngo Wang (F.2) and Chan Kwan Ying (F.2) won the Gold Award in International Coding Elite Challenge 2022. Yung Sze Wai (F.3) and Chan Ngo Wang (F.2) won the First Prize in CodeCombat CodeQuest 2022.

Cheung Wai Fung (F.6) and Koo Ho Yin (F.6) won the Third Honour Award in the 38th Chinese Physics Olympiad.

Quiz Team won the First Runner-up in the 2021 Occupational Safety and Health Quiz Competition.

Twenty-six students, from Form 3 to Form 5, entered a competition 'JA Company Program'. Our students formed their own business, 'HKiddo'. They won the First Runner-up in the Most Popular Social Innovation.

Chan Chi Kan (F.6) and Hui Wan (F.6) participated in the 10th Inter-school Competition of Project Learning on Hong Kong's History and Culture. They did a research study on the history of Divine Word Missionary in Hong Kong. They won the First Runner-up in the competition (Written Report).

Kwok Ching Nam (F.3) won the First Class Honour. Lam Chun Hei (F.3) and Yung Sze Wai (F.3) won the Second Class Honour in the International Junior Science Olympiad (Hong Kong Selection) 2022.

Lam Kwan Wang (F.5) and Ho Chun Hoo (F.3) won the Championship and Silver Prize in the Robot Creative Painting Competition, respectively.

Ting Chi Ho (F.4) won the First Runner-up in the 25th Anniversary of the Establishment of HKSAR Painting Competition (Secondary School Section).

String Orchestra won the Silver Award, Sze Yat Chun (F.1) won the Gold Award in Piano Solo-Intermediate, in the Joint School Music Competition 2022. Wong Long Ka (F.2) won the Second Prize in Fringe Inter-school Music Competition 2022 (Grade 8 Violin). Lee Chun Hei (F.1) won the Second Prize in the Hong Kong Music Talent Award 2021 – Saxophone Category Secondary School Junior Class.

In Inter-school Athletics Competitions: Li Lok Him (F.2) won the Championship in 200m and 400m race. Chung Tak Chak (F.3) won the Championship in 1500m race.

Chen Qingyuan (F.5) won a lot of First Place in the Virtual International Open Rope Skipping Tournament including Single Rope Team Freestyle, Double Dutch Speed Relay and Single Rope Pair Freestyle.

In the 73rd Hong Kong Schools Speech Festival, Safraz Muhammad Sulayman (F.1), Chow Chun Kee (F.2) and Hee Chi Him (F.4) won the Championship in Solo Verse Speaking (English). Ng Pak Lam (F.2) and Kwok Yuk Fung (F.4) won the Championship in Solo Prose (English). Chan Chun Ting (F.6) won the Championship in the Solo Prose Speaking (Cantonese). Zhao Chao Yue (F.2) won the Championship in Solo Verse Speaking (Putonghua).

Our Bridge Team won the Second Runner-up in the Rose Bowl 2022.

Our students were actively involved in community service. We joined the 'Heart to Heart Project' - organized by the Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups. It was our 16th year of participation. Within the school year 2021-2022, our students contributed 30,650 hours of community services inside school and outside school.

School Affairs

Attracted by the good education we provide, 336 primary students applied for the discretionary places. As the Government capped the cohort size at 170, we were allowed to offer only 51 discretionary places. Through central allocation, 109 students were assigned to the school.

A Pre-S1 Summer Programme was conducted to help the new F.1 students to learn the study skills and to adapt to the school life.

The Principal, the Vice Principals and 2 Department Heads joined the School Leaders' Workshops, held by the EDB, on 7th and 13th June 2022 to have an interflow with other schools on value education.

The Principal and Vice Principals attended a sharing session on how to use the 'PISA' findings in evaluating our school in June 2022.

The Principal worked as the external reviewer in the EDB's External School Review Team to gain experience of ESR in June 2022.

Auditors from the EDB paid a visit to the school from 25th April to 27th April 2022. Some advice was given to the school on school financial and personnel management.

Two parents' talks were held to let them understand the 5 core Values of Catholic Education and how to prevent the children from too much screen time on mobile phones.

A new online platform 'Grwth' was used to send parents' notices and collect money from parents.

IP Phone system was installed to improve communication between parents and teachers.

A charger for electric vehicles was installed to promote Environmental Education.

The 50th Anniversary Magazine was published and distributed.

A teaching assistant (Library) was recruited to help in the library.

The total number of teaching staff establishment was 63. With the Careers and Life Planning Grant and Capacity Enhancement Grant, we employed 2 contract teachers and 2 teaching assistants in the school year. With the Learning Support Grant, we employed one more teaching assistant for the SEN support. With the Administration Grant and Teachers' Relief Grant, we employed two more teaching assistants, one for Pastoral Ministry and one for the library operation.

To provide a better learning environment for our students, our school campus was improved. The school applied to the EDB for funding for major repairs, including replacing the wooden floor in the school hall. Furthermore, the floor mat and the conference tables in the Conference Room were replaced. Cabinets were set up to display the historical items of our school The statue of Jesus Christ was cleaned and repaired. More ventilation fans were installed in the school hall, staffroom and staff common room.

By the end of the school year, Vice Principal Mr. Poon Wai Cheong and Janitor Mrs. Tang Fok Lai Ha retired. Ms. Leung Suk Lin, Ms. Wu Dik Shun, Ms. Mang Choi Yu, Ms. Wong Fung Yee, Mr. Lee Cheuk Wai, Ms. Ho Ping Ting, Ms. Lo Mei Ling resigned. Their dedicated service was much appreciated.

Report on School's Major Concerns

There were three major concerns for the 2021-2022 school year.

1. To help students to learn the core Catholic values

Sharing sessions on the 5 core Catholic values were held in the morning assemblies in the first term before the 5th wave of pandemic. The Principal gave sharing on 'Truth', 'Justice', 'Love', 'Life' and 'Family' every Monday.

A sharing session on 'gratitude' by Bishop Chow Sau Yan, Bishop of Hong Kong was attended by all F.3 students, all Catholic students, and all teachers on 1st August 2022. Students realized the importance of gratitude. The positive feelings of appreciation and gratitude helped the students to feel love in their families and their lives, and this led to a more meaningful life.

Two students, one from F.2 and one from F.3 were baptized on 5th June 2022 in the Holy Family Parish. Three students, from F.2 to F.3, had their confirmation on the same date.

Led by Mrs. Kwok Cheng Mei Ling, the Catholic Education Coordinator, the Catholic Education Committee organized many meaningful programmes. (1) The Life Education Programme for F.1 and F.2 was launched. (2) Seven catholic teachers joined the Annual Retreat organized by the Catholic Religious Schools Council. (3) There was a talk for parents on the five core Catholic values. (4) Catechetical lessons for students were held. (5) There were Catholic Society activities. Besides, in the staff meetings, academic affairs meetings and student support meetings, Mrs. Kwok delivered the messages of the importance of promoting catholic education in the school. All Departments addressed this concern in their curricula, e.g. in BAFS, teachers emphasized 'Love and Justice' in the topic Business ethics, 'Love and Family' in Personal Financial management; in Liberal Studies, Chinese Language, Mathematics, RME and other Departments, the five core values were instilled in the lessons.

More religious components were integrated in F.1 RME lessons.

The work of mosaic wall of the Joyful Mysteries of the Holy Rosary was in progress.

2. To promote students' reading habit

To provide opportunities for students to develop a wide range of reading skills, extend learning of the content and connect their learning experiences across different subjects, the Reading Across the Curriculum Committee was set up to promote students' reading habit. The Committee promoted reading at school by strengthening resources for reading to meet diverse needs, organizing activities to allow students to enjoy reading across subjects, and developing skills and strategies of students in reading.

The Chinese Language Department and the Library jointly organized 3 joint school reading activities. Cognitio College (Kowloon), Heep Yunn College, St Paul's Secondary School (Lam Tin) and Leung Shek Chee College were invited to participate.

29 e-books were selected from the e-Reading Programme of Hong Kong Education City. The headcount of online reading rose from 130 to 1,475.

Class Library programme was also launched. Some new books were purchased and stored in the classrooms for students to read and to write reading experiences.

Form 1 students visited the Hong Kong Central Library on 7th, 14th, 21st, 28th November 2021 (中一「悅」讀之旅), held by the Extra-Curricular Activities Department, Reading Across the Curriculum Committee and the Library. A reading booklet was well designed for students. It contained a reading habit survey, some book reviews and library activities to let them explore in the trip.

10 students had enrolled in the Junior Secondary History e-Reading Award Scheme 2022 organized by the EDB and HKU.

Ten iPads were equipped for students to use in the library. Several reading apps including Ming Pao News and Apps for reading AR Books were installed in the iPads to facilitate students to read.

In English Department, the Book of My Choice Scheme was implemented. Each F.5 student was given an English book of their choice to encourage leisure reading. Internal Extensive Reading Scheme (ERS) was conducted as usual and an ERS Book Report Competition was held to acknowledge the hard work of students. Not only the English teachers, but also all other teachers and students were entitled to access both NYTimes.com and NYT in Education. Teachers and students were encouraged to read extensively to gain a global perspective of different subjects.

Moreover, more benches and tables were placed on campus to facilitate students' reading.

A QEF project was designed to upgrade the library facilities.

To motivate students to visit the library, a book voting was held in June 2022, which encouraged students to suggest books for Library to purchase. Books like "Dune" by Frank Herbert, Haruki Murakami's new novel and series of "When History Meows" were selected.

Many teachers promoted reading in their lessons. For example, in Chemistry, some interesting passages were adapted from journals and newspapers and were used to prepare Online Reading Tasks shared through Google Classrooms for F.3 to F.5 students. In many other departments, such as Geography and History, students' reading habit was promoted by newspaper cutting exercise and oral presentation.

3. To promote teachers' professionalism through sharing

Sharing among teachers was held regularly to promote teacher's professionalism. Several online short meetings were held to discuss the teaching arrangements and to share the best practices using IT in teaching.

Teachers shared materials and experiences that they gained from training courses, talks and seminars from EDB, universities and other institutes in the departmental meetings.

A sharing platform was set up for sharing lesson materials, teaching strategies and materials gathered from seminars and workshops using Google Shared Drives and Microsoft OneNote.

Departmental peer lesson observation and post-observation discussion were held. Suggestions for improvement were made by the Department Heads and members.

Due to the COVID outbreak and class suspension, the spiritual and mental health of students was much affected. During this school year, 2 workshops were conducted for all teachers on 'Workshop on Prevention of Student Suicide and Student Mental Health' and 'Student Mental Health Support – Early Identification and Intervention' by our school social workers, educational psychologist and guidance teachers, to provide professional advice to teachers on measures to enhance students' mental wellness.

School Management and Staff Consultation

In the 2021-2022 school year, the school was managed, administered and operated by the Incorporated Management Committee in accordance to the Constitution laid down by the IMC which shall comply with the Education Ordiance and the code of aid for secondary schools.

The IMC was composed of 8 SVD managers appointed by the Sponsoring Body, 1 parent manager and 1 alternate parent manager, 1 teacher manager and 1 alternate teacher manager, 1 alumni manger and 1 independent manager.

The registered SVD Managers were Rev. Johnson Dhos, Supervisor and the Chairperson of the IMC, Rev. Flandez Jay Roa, Rev. Venus Arjay Apinado, Rev. John Baptist Le Van Ba, Rev. Hadiarto Heribertus, Rev. Balubun Anthonius Reynolds, Rev. Mullackal Chakkappan Manoj, and Rev. Paul ZhongXue Chen was the Alternate SVD Manager.

The Teacher Manager was Ms. Yang Ka Wah and the Alternate Teacher Manager was Mr. Hui Chi Kuen.

The Parent Manager was Ms. Ho Sum Yue and the Alternate Parent Manager was Mr. Chen FengNan.

The Alumni Manager was Mr. Lee Pui Keung and the Independent Manager was Mr. Tsui Pee Tak.

The Honorary Manager was Rev. John Zhang Xinghao.

Mrs. Kwok Cheng Mei Ling, Mr. Poon Wai Cheong and Mr. Yung Lit Hung, the Vice Principals, attended IMC meetings by invitation.

Our school's administrative arrangements emphasize staff consultation. There were three consultative committees: the Academic Affairs Committee, the Student Support Committee and the Administrative Affairs Committee to discuss matters related to academic affairs, student affairs and staff welfare respectively. These three committees aimed at providing optimal opportunity for consultation between the principal and the teaching staff. Besides, staff meetings were held about four times per school year. Apart from reporting, these meetings also aimed to collect the opinion of teachers. After consultation, sometimes decisions were made by the principal. For important matters, the final decision was made by the IMC.

Routine decisions were made by the Principal and the Executive Committee. This committee, comprising the Principal and the three Vice Principals met about once a week.



a. Teachers' Establishment


The number of teachers stood at 65. There were 35 male teachers and 30 female teachers. One of them was an English native-speaker. In addition, there were 4 technicians, 6 office staff members, 12 janitors and 6 teaching assistants. Among the teachers, 15 were Catholics.

b. Teachers' Qualification

Of the 65 teachers, all of them had a bachelor degree, 2 had doctoral degrees, 41 had a master degree, 62 had received professional training, 42 had more than 10 years of teaching experience. All our English and Chinese teachers were subject trained.

d. Teachers' Continuing Professional Development Report

This year, teachers spent a total of 3087 hours on continuing professional development, averaging 47.5 hours per teacher.

The first Staff Development Day was held on 9 November 2021. In the morning session, a talk on national security law and school safety was conducted to strengthen school's understanding of the importance of the overall planning of the national security education at the curriculum level. It is hoped that through the talks, discussions and interactive sessions, the use of different teaching and learning resources of the national security law could be systematically implemented as a whole-school curriculum.

In the afternoon session, colleagues were formed into groups to try out 3 new ball games: Dodgebee, floorball and lawn bowls. Colleagues got a chance to stretch and exercise by trying out the new ball games. Mini matches were also arranged at the end of the session. The second staff development day was conducted on 12 May 2022. An onsite teacher workshop was arranged to synergise efforts and form consensus in safeguarding national security. Teachers formed into groups according to their academic subjects. There were discussions and interactive sessions to deepen and extend colleagues' understanding of the national security law.

Student Profile

a. General

On 1 September 2021, the student enrolment was 941, with 167, 164, 163, 150, 160 and 137 in F1 to F6 respectively. One of the reasons for the decrease of students was the students' withdrawal from school. On 24 August 2022, there were only 919 students, with 162, 156, 159, 147, 159 and 136 in F.1 to F.6 respectively. 22 students withdrew during the school year.

About 75% lived in Kwun Tong District. 9% students are Catholics while most students did not have any religion. The median family monthly income was \$223,999.

b. Reading Habit

Students borrowed 1,886 books from the school library. The daily average issue rate was 16. This statistics excluded the books loaned under the Extensive Reading Schemes, whose loan rate was 1892. To ease the problem, students can borrow books of Chinese ERS and English ERS during Chinese and English lessons. This allowed students more time to choose books and could increase the number of book checkouts.

The class size in Form 1 has to be reduced according to EDB's regulation. This year the class size was 34.

All the allocated Form 1 students are basically in Band 1. Some of the students who were weaker in English and Chinese would be allocated in Form 1A. Double manning was adopted in the English and Chinese Language lessons. There is no streaming policy for Form 2 and 3. All the 5 classes in each form 2 and 3 are more or less of the same academic standard.

Streaming starts in Form 4 and students are allocated into 5 classes according to their preferences and their academic standards. Form 4 students have to study 4 core subjects – English, Chinese, Maths and Liberal Studies/Citizenship and Social Development and 3 electives.

Curriculum

The design of our curriculum centers on our mission - to enable students to live a full life; a life that is healthy, affluent and meaningful.

To live a meaningful life, one must have proper values. In Sing Yin, we treasure Christian and good Chinese values the most. Consequently, we allocate two lessons per cycle throughout the 6 years of schooling on moral and civic education. These are supported by many other programs and activities outside of lesson hours.

Apart from moral development, we aim to provide a broad education through a balance of subjects. There is a balanced curriculum in academic and cultural subjects. Furthermore, a great variety of options of academic subjects are offered to our Form 4 to Form 6 students.

a. Religious and Moral Education

From the time it was founded in 1970, our school has always emphasized the moral development of our students through both formal and informal means. Moral Education is formally taught, with two periods per cycle, in all classes, from Form 1 to Form 6. In the mid-90s' with the approach of Hong Kong's return to China, Civic Education is incorporated with the objective of helping students to better understand and know our country. A range of activities is organized to foster moral development and civic duties of the students. These include Morning Reflection, weekly prayers, talks, visits and community services. Please refer to the departmental report for more details.

It is through formal teaching and various activities that help our students to develop into citizens who love themselves and their neighbour, set their eyes on the district, help build Hong Kong, care about their Mother land and embrace the world.

Our school aims to expand the horizon of our students' spirituality, to introduce them to Christian principles, values and beliefs and to help them find the meaning of life.

To develop our students' spirituality, we introduce our students to the Catholic faith and Christian beliefs through formal scheduled lessons, in which they have a chance to reflect and judge if these are worthwhile for themselves.

At the same time we try to deepen our Catholic students' faith and to introduce the joy brought forth by the Gospel to them through various religious activities.

Special programmes are organized for Catholic students every Tuesday afternoon to foster their faith. The Catholic Society also arranges retreat, Way of the Cross, visits and community service for its members. Other activities during the year may include: Prayer Service for the new school year; morning mass for F1 to F5 students; visit and caroling in "Home for the Aged"; and lessons for students interested in the Catholic faith.

The workload for catholic teachers is great. We employed a teaching assistant to help with the catholic activities. Rev. John Zhang Xinghao, S.V.D. was also kind to join us as a teacher for Religious and Moral Education since 2011. He was now the Head of RME Department.

b. Period Allocation For Subjects

The timetable is made up of a 6-day cycle consisting 48 periods. F4 to F6 students have 4 core subjects and 3 electives.

e. Medium of Instruction

Our school aims at trilingulism in English, Cantonese and Putonghua, and biliteracy in English and Chinese for all students. Of course the proficiency level expected for each of these languages differs. In spoken language, we expect students to speak excellent Cantonese, fluent English and reasonable Putonghua. In written language, we expect them to write excellent Chinese and English.

English is adopted as the medium of instruction for all subjects other than Putonghua and Chinese subjects, P.E., Visual Art, and RME. An English Teacher was appointed as the Chairperson of the the English Language Across the Curriculum (LAC) Committee. Since 1999, a native-speaking English teacher (NET) has been employed to give additional support to other teachers and our students. Usually, during the summer holiday, a short English programme is organized for new Form 1 students. However, due to the COVID-19 outbreak, the Summer Bridging English Programme was postponed to September 2021. In 2010, the EDB announced the new policy "Fine-tuning of MOI". However, we were not affected at all. Our present MOI is the same as before, that is, English is our major medium of instruction for all classes. Analysis revealed that our students' academic achievement is not compromised.

Extra-curricular Activities

A wide range of activities is organized outside regular school hours. They provide students the opportunity to discover their interests and their creativity, discover their potential, develop their leadership qualities and improve their communication skills. All students are benefited by taking part in good leisure activities which will help them to be physically and psychologically healthy, and refraining from bad pastimes.

Through participation in extra-curricular activities, we aim at enhancing a sense of belonging and brotherhood of Sing Yin boys through horizontal and vertical integration of both teachers and students. Hence there is nothing "extra" about extra-curricular activities. Sing Yin looks upon these activities as an integral part of the education we offer. Students are expected to treat the activities just like formal lessons. For example, once they sign up for an activity, they have the duty to attend it. If necessary, they have to follow the procedures for asking for leaves.

Students are free to join the clubs. They are expected to be a member of at least one club and remain active members throughout the school year. F.1 to F.5 students should devote more time on ECA. They are encouraged to join one club for a number of years to deepen their knowledge and skill in a particular area that interests them the most. They should also join other clubs for a year or so to broaden their interests. F.6 students should put their focus back on their study, joining one club is an appropriate balance.

The Students' Association was set up in the mid-70s' and has since been playing a very active role in the school. Its executive committee is elected by students. Apart from serving as a bridge between the students and the school by reflecting students' opinion and making suggestions for the welfare of the students, it also provides services and organizes many activities such as the sale of stationary, subscription and distribution of newspaper, blood donation, and many others.

There were 60 ECA clubs to cater for different interests of students. The academic clubs provide opportunities for students to gain knowledge and experience to supplement the formal curriculum. The interest clubs provides chances for students to take part in interschool competitions, to participate in outdoor activities, visits and outdoor training and fund-raising activities. The Catholic Society organizes weekly Catholic lessons and religious activities for the faith formation of Catholic students, guide students to discover Christian values and beliefs; and to enhance their spiritual and moral development. The Community Service Group organizes activities for the community. Through these real life experiences, our students are enriched with the best possible set of values by which to live a meaningful life. The Sing Yin Pioneers, the Catholic Society, Scouts, the Student Association also organize community service programmes.

There are post-exam activities for F1- F5 students. The activity programme is organized after the final exam in early July. The activities include talks on topics of interest, cultural performance, quizzes, singing contest, sports games, visits and field trips, etc. In the 60 ECA clubs, there were 2179 members. On average, each student joined 2.32 clubs. The total club expenditure was \$31,165.73. Please note that the total expenditure excluded the costs/fees of training courses, which were much higher than these expenses.

Support For Students

Sing Yin adopts a whole school approach to support students. Every staff member-teachers, office staff, teaching assistants, and janitors are there to help our students. Students are also encouraged to help fellow schoolmates. Students in need can approach any staff member or suitable fellow students for help. Of course, there are times when professional help should be provided. In these cases, students will be referred to our school social workers.

For daily life problems, students can approach fellow students for help. Our Sing Yin Pioneers, Prefects, Student Association and Club officials are all there to help. Of course, Class Teacher and subject teachers are there to help too.

Any student who wishes to talk over personal problem is encouraged to do so with his Class Teacher. However, if the student should, for any reason, prefer to talk to someone other than his Class Teacher, he may approach his subject teachers or a member of the departments listed below.

a. Guidance Department - it aims to help students develop positive self-concepts, achieve personal growth and interpersonal skills, and realize their own potential to the full. A team of counseling teachers, together with the social worker, organize and conduct both preventive and developmental programmes for the students to achieve these objectives. The programmes include personal growth groups, peer tutoring groups, leadership training programmes and orientation programmes. The Department also organizes Parents' Day to promote better communication between school and parents. All along the school adopts the "Whole School Approach to Guidance" to provide better service to the students.

- b. Careers Department it aims to prepare students to make sound decisions on further education and career opportunities. Through visits to organizations and exhibitions, talks, seminars, information on education, employment and training opportunities is disseminated to assist students in making the right choice.
- c. Discipline Department it aims to ensure good manners and good order in each classroom and throughout the school, to foster a healthy school culture in which effective teaching and learning can take place. Students are encouraged to develop self-discipline, to respect the rights and property of others and to attain a high standard of behaviour. They shall be responsible for their own behaviour and breaches of school rules may incur some penalty. However punishment will be accompanied by efforts to teach students the appropriate behaviour so that they can learn to be self-disciplined. As a preventive measure our school is adopting the Whole School Approach to Guidance and Discipline whereby all teachers participate actively in assisting students to resolve their problems. Students who suffer from discipline problems can approach any teachers for help. If necessary, they will be referred to discipline team members.

d. Health & Safety Department

We also have a team of teachers to provide guidance on health related problems. They give advice students on physical health, mental health and fitness issues.

e. Financial Support to students

Besides emotional support, we also offer financial support to our students. Using government funds, donated funds or our own funds, we offer financial subsidy for needy students to support their extra-curricular activities organized by Sing Yin, including training courses, study tours and graduate dinners. In particular, in the 2021-22 school year, \$24,850.00 from the School-based After-school Learning and Support Programme was used to subsidize 37 needy students. The \$20,652.50 from the Student Activities Support Grant helped subsidize 25 students. Their personal and social development and community involvement improved moderately.

Students' Performance

a. Students' Service

Students have the opportunity to take up voluntary social service through the Community Service Group, Community Youth Club, Sing Yin Pioneers, Catholic Society and Boy Scouts. Other organizations also contribute. Moreover, students have abundant chances to serve their fellow schoolmates in school.

This year, through the five groups mentioned above and programmes run by the Community Services Department, our students provided 30,650 hours of social service in this school year, with an average of 32.5 hours per person. The service hour exceeded the standard of 2000 hours set by the Heart to Heart Programme organized by the Hong Kong Federation of Youth, which we joined in 2006.

On the Dress Casual Day (26/10/2021), the Students' Association raised a total amount of \$6,710. On Blood Donation Day (30/11/2021), 29 students and teachers donated their blood. The low participation rate was mainly due to the pandemic.


b. Students' Discipline


Through these efforts and all our teachers' efforts, our students behaved very well. Their attendance rates and punctuality rates stood above 98% and 99% respectively.

The number of suspension from lessons was 0 and detention periods on Saturdays was 531. 31.7% of the offending students were detained because they failed to hand in their assignments habitually.


Distribution of the detention periods on Saturdays (2019-2022)




Common Reasons of the Students to have periods of Detention (2019-2022)




Attendance Rate of Student in 2021-2022





Punctuality Rate of Student in 2021-22







